- ❖ The institution's only source of funding, apart from the fees collected from self-financed courses, is limited.

Recommendation:

- An exclusive feedback on the newly introduced Autonomous Status must be taken from the students & other stakeholders.
- The self-financing courses must be reviewed and a rigorous policy must be adopted for the smooth functioning of these courses.
- Causes of drop out students across discipline must be identified.
- Teachers must be encouraged to publish UGC care listed journal and specially for research project.
- Courses on global importance such as artificial intelligence may be incorporated in near future.
- Initiative for industry –academia collaboration at both departmental & institutional level must be taken in near future.
